CONSUMER PRICE INDICES AND INFLATION RATES FOR FEBRUARY 2015

Kenya National Bureau of Statistics hereby releases Consumer Price Indices (CPI) and inflation rates for February, 2015. These numbers have been generated using data collected during the second and third weeks of the month under review. The prices were obtained from selected retail outlets in 25 data collection zones located in 13 urban centers.

As shown in Tables 1 and 2, the CPI increased by 0.46 per cent from 153.43 in January 2015 to 154.14 in February 2015. The overall inflation rate stood at 5.61 per cent in February 2015.

Between January and February 2015, Food and Non-Alcoholic Drinks' Index increased by 1.32 per cent. The increase in index was mainly attributed to increased cost of ordinary vegetables, milk and other products due to the weather conditions experienced in the first two months of the year. In

aggregate, increase in food inflation resulted from observed rises in the prices of several food items outweighing falls in the prices of others.

Over the same period, Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas and Other Fuels' Index, decreased by 0.12 per cent. As indicated in Table 3 above, the slight decline is due to the significant falls in the cost of kerosene and cooking gas.

During the same review period, the Transport Index decreased by 1.56 per cent. This resulted mainly from notable reductions in the pump prices of petrol and diesel.
